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

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Town Deal projects gain momentum

The St Ives Town Deal projects are gathering momentum, with the closure of the Guildhall signalling a major stage of redevelopment getting under way.

The farmers and antiques market have moved temporarily to the Island Centre while the refurbishment gets under way. The Guildhall has been managed by the town council since 2013. It has always provided a space for live performance and entertainment for the local community. Now the town council aims to:

- re-develop the front of the building to provide a warm welcome to all:
- re-invest in the fabric of the building, fit for the 21st century, bringing in energy efficiency and sound reduction measures, plus a high-quality audio and visual set-up;
- introduce a versatile and comfortable new seating system, that is quick to turn around to make the space more flexible; and
- create a diverse programme of events and activities.

Work is getting under way, too, on the St Ives Theatre, home to the hugely successful and influential Kidz R Us team. The theatre has


received its first grant payment of £109,000 from the Town Deal Fund, as part of a £1.5m project to refurbish and extend the venue.

Planning permission for the project was granted in January 2023, with work on the first phase – the roof and façade of the converted Wesleyan chapel – beginning later the same month. Led by Shaun Rothwell and a team from Rothwell Historical Restoration, this phase was completed at the beginning of April, enabling the theatre to stage



its summer programme. Work on the second phase of the project, which is supported by funding from the Town Deal, is currently due to begin in early January.

Nine projects in St Ives have been approved to share £19.9m from the government's Town Deal. These include plans to create a low–carbon transport system, support local business and jobs, and develop new skills and supply chains, as well as provide new and transformed housing and community assets. Of these six projects — St Ives Community Orchard and Nature Reserve, Leach Pottery, St Ives Guildhall, Housing and Rugby Club relocation, St Ives Enterprise Grants scheme, and St Ives Theatre — have now received their first grant payments from the fund.

The nights are longer it's lighting up time

It may seem like summer's only just gone, but the season of Christmas is nearly upon us. St Ives Bay becomes a magical place in winter, and there's plenty going on for locals and visitors alike.

Aimed at bringing a little sparkle and magic to the street in darker evenings, St Ives BID's Winter Lights programme commenced as soon as the clocks went back on 29th October. Incidentally, despite being one of the biggest sets of town lights in Europe, St Ives' are also incredibly energy efficient. The Fore Street lights, for example, cost just 7p a day to run.



The big night, of course, is Wednesday, 13th December, when Father Christmas will make his annual arrival in town on the Lifeboat. Coming ashore at about 6:30 pm, he will then process along The Wharf into Fore Street, Market Square, High Street, Tregenna Place, and then on to Café Art in Royal Square where






he will be greeted by the mayor, Johnnie Wells. The big switch-on of the town Christmas lights will take place from Café Art between 7pm and 7.30pm where the main tree in the square will also be lit.



Although yet to be confirmed officially as we went to press, we expect the New Year's Eve celebrations, and midnight fireworks, to take their usual colourful form. A chat with wholesaler Graham Bradshaw

Cornish Sea Salt is now exported across the globe. How did it all begin?

The founder of the company, Tony Fraser, was out walking on the Lizard many years ago when he found what turned out to be an Iron Age salt works in a remote cove. He did



some research, and discovered that the salt harvested there had been used as a preservative for Cornish pilchards. Tony wondered if this process could be revived, and 15 years ago, harvesting of sea salt began at Porthkerris Beach. Though his perseverance, Tony brought the business to where it is now. Cornish Sea Salt is now sold in more than 30 countries. The plant at Porthkerris operates 24 hours a day, so there's always enough salt to send around the world.

Why do you think it has been so successful? It has a unique flavour, because of the high mineral content – it's high in magnesium and calcium, but low in sodium. The salt is hand-harvested eight metres from the water's edge, so it doesn't travel very far! It fits in well with the interest there is now in buying local, and the resurgence in people cooking at home due to the cost-of-living crisis.

How did the business develop?

We sell salt as flakes now, as well as the original crystals, and we've moved into flavoured salts as a follow-on from the core product. When the salt has been harvested, we add other natural ingredients using various blending techniques. Chili and garlic was the first flavour, and it's still popular today. Others which go down well are lemon and thyme – it works really well with chicken and fish – and a seaweed blend, using seaweed from Coverack, not far from where the salt is harvested. Various chefs have passed on ideas for different flavours, and we develop new flavours every few months: regular customers are always waiting for the new ones to come. The latest ones are herb, piri piri and smoky paprika. And we're launched a Super Seed Topper, with nigella seeds and poppy seeds, which has a Mediterranean-style flavour and can be used with salads.



How did you become involved with the company?

I was in the entertainment business for many years, organising weddings and events, which I enjoyed, but I felt like having a change, and I've been with Cornish Sea Salt almost since the start. I didn't know much about food, but you soon learn! I now represent the company at food shows and farmers' markets all around the Westcountry, up as far as Bristol. I give advice to people about how different salts go with different meals. Sometimes customers give me recipes, which I love trying at home. I can then pass the recipes to other customers.

What do you recommend for Christmas cooking?

Roasting salt is the Christmas one – it's flavoured with garlic, onion, rosemary and sage. We do gift packs which make great Christmas presents for foodies: stacks of up to eight different flavours. People can choose their selection from any of our salts.

Recipe: Mushroom Breton with Cheddar and herb crumb

A winter warmer from resident St Ives Local chef, Danny Rouncefield, AKA The Cornish Chef. "Great as a starter, or with some pasta mixed in for a warming main course," says Danny. "It can be turned vegan easily with the alternatives you can now get."

INGREDIENTS

200g button mushrooms
Half a white onion
Clove of garlic
40g thyme
Olive oil, for frying
200ml double cream
50g butter
50g parsley
100ml white wine
50g panko breadcrumbs
50g Cheddar cheese
Good quality sea salt
Cracked black pepper
Pea shoots for garnish

METHOD

Start off by finely chopping your white onion, garlic, and half the thyme. In a large, thick-bottomed saucepan warm up a drizzle of olive oil until it starts to shimmer. Add in your chopped ingredients and allow to soften.

While this is happening, quarter the mushrooms. When the onion is soft without colour, add the mushrooms to the pan and allow to fry for 2 or 3 minutes. Pour in the white wine and allow the mix to come back up to heat. Reduce by half.



Pour in the cream, chopped parsley, and a good pinch of salt and pepper. Reduce heat and simmer for 5 minutes to allow the cream to thicken. Once the cream has thickened, add the butter and stir into the sauce. This will give a smooth glossy texture.

While this is happening, make your crumb topping by mixing the Cheddar, chopped thyme and panko breadcrumbs, together with a pinch of black pepper.

Get 4 tapas bowls, or ramekins. If you don't have either, you can do one large Breton in a pie dish and serve at the table to share. Pour your mix into your chosen dishes and top with the herby crumb.

Grill until breadcrumbs are golden. Finish by topping with pea shoots.

American pop legends the Three Degrees, who arrived early for cream teas – Cornish style, with jam first, of course – before the first of 31 dates on their UK tour, messaged: "We had a wonderful time at our sold-out show in St Ives. An incredible cream tea at Pedn Olva with the most beautiful views! Thank you to everyone who looked after us. We had a wonderful day and a fabulous show! You were all on fire."

Anna "Songbird" Fern, after appearing at three venues in three days agreed: "Loved every minute, and loved performing at this amazing festival". And a year on from her debut, St Ives singer-songwriter Nicole Tesseyman said: "I owe my start to the St Ives September Festival. I've thoroughly enjoyed being part of it for the second year running and hope to always be part of it in the future. I also enjoyed watching all the other amazing musicians and singers. The overall buzz in the town was fantastic."

Lounge in the Big Cellar beneath Porthmeor Studios for the whole of the second week. As well as The Three Degrees, "House Full" signs were posted by Show of Hands – on what could be their last St Ives appearance as they embarked on their Final Circle tour – the Good Old Fashioned Lover Boys' Queen Live show (for the second successive year), comedian Gary Delaney and the Bowie Lounge Space Face 10th anniversary show.

Spirit of Place at three separate venues – and talks filling smaller venues.

The sold-out trend continued with Irish folk star Cara Dillon and the Celtic Male Ensemble at St Ia Church, with several music events, films – including showings of Cornwall-made Zennor The festival will inevitably have a different look next year, with the Guildhall closed until the spring of 2025 for a major renovation project – but that could mean bigger audiences for some rising stars keen to appear at other venues all over town.

St Ives Museum: 21st century tech highlights historic artefacts

Visitors to St Ives Museum in its centenary year will be able to gain new insights into the exhibits on display, following the launch of a digital guide – technology which would have seemed extraordinary when the museum opened in 1924.

The guide, which features fascinating multimedia content, is available on Bloomberg Connects, a free arts and cultural app created by Bloomberg Philanthropies. St Ives Museum joins more than 250 organisations which are already part of the initiative, including Penlee House in Penzance and Falmouth Art Gallery.

The museum houses a broad range of St Ivesrelated artefacts, with an emphasis on the town's fishing and maritime heritage. It also covers mining, farming, the railway, and the early history of arts and crafts in St Ives.

Visitors using the app can view a Welcome message from curator Andy Smith, and scroll through the museum's collections with the help of local people like Margaret Sobey, whose grandfather, William Freeman, was the sole survivor of the 1939 lifeboat disaster. There are also memories from a seaman who was a "deck boy" on board MV



Trebartha, part of the fleet of St Ives' renowned Hain Steamship Company. As assistant curator Peter Garratt says: "Stories like these give people more of an insight into the history of St Ives than they get from just looking at items in a cabinet."

Peter discovered Bloomberg Connects through the Cornwall Museums Partnership, and realised it could offer great benefits to St Ives Museum. "The app is designed with accessibility in mind, which is great for us, as it's the approach we're already taking. It enables us to create audio and visual content, and information in different languages and in large text for people who are visually impaired. Bloomberg Connects provides technical support, a content management system, translation, captioning and transcription of audio."



Peter says the app has a threefold purpose. "The first is that it enables people to plan their visit, by giving them information about opening hours, the museum's history and the scope of the collection, plus further details about some of our exhibits. The second is that when people are here, the app provides them with extra information to enhance the quality of their visit, and gives them more details about some of our highlights. Finally, it links to our website and Instagram, and offers information about other art attractions in St Ives."

A highlight for the museum in 2023 was the staging of a major exhibition, Discovering St Ives, which showcased the work of Victorian artists who visited the town before the establishment of the artistic community. In 2022, the museum achieved charitable status, which will enable greater access to grant funding. It is now seeking more business sponsorship.



As St Ives Museum finalises plans to celebrate its centenary next year, Peter says: "Our aim is to modernise the museum without spoiling it. Lots of people like its traditional nature, but others prefer to consume information in new ways. We can cater for both."

The museum is currently closed for its winter break, but will re-open at the start of April 2024. The Bloomberg Connects app is available to download from Google Play or the App Store.

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Out on the Towans

A new era dawns for the dunes conservation charity

Autumn and winter is always a busy time for Friends of the Towans, and organising the latest programme of practical conservation sessions across the dunes was one of the first tasks for the charity's new Volunteer Coordinator, Sara Dowler.

Sara brings to her new role 12 years of experience as a National Trust ranger, including a period based in St Ives Bay, so she is familiar with the landscape of the Towans and understands its importance as the home of a huge number of different flora and fauna, some of which are nationally rare.



Sara is from Herefordshire, but she always felt drawn to the sea, and it was this which brought her to Cornwall more than 25 years ago, after studying environmental engineering and conservation. "When I discovered an opportunity to become a full-time volunteer with the conservation charity BTCV in Cornwall, I knew it was exactly what I wanted to do," she says.

She went on to become BTCV's Project Officer for the St Ives Green Gym, which aimed to help people improve their health and wellbeing through taking part in practical environmental activities. "We did a bit of work on the Towans, and I remember seeing the amazing view of St Ives Bay from Peter's Point at Gwithian Towans. It was one of those 'wow' places."

After her years as a National Trust ranger, Sara trained as a Forest School leader, and since the

birth of her son six years ago, she has also worked at a health food shop in Falmouth and run basket and nature-based craft workshops. "When I saw the role of part-time Volunteer Coordinator with Friends of the Towans, I thought 'This is amazing!' she says. "It was a way of getting back into conservation work which offered the flexibility I was looking for as a mum."

Almost as soon as she started her new job in September, Sara was helping FOTT trustees and volunteers prepare material for the charity's stall at the Hayle Health and Wellbeing Festival. Then it was time to draw up the new season's programme of practical sessions, which, as she says, is the bread and butter of the charity's work. The first session, at Gwithian Towans in October, involved weeding out buddleia and elder seedlings, and starting to cut through an area of gorse and blackthorn to provide an area of bare sand and encourage the growth of dune grassland.

Regular meetings are taking take place on Thursdays from 10am to 2pm, and Sara will be running extra sessions at weekends to give families and people who work during the week the chance to get involved in FOTT's work. There are also opportunities to take part in habitat monitoring, and to be part of a team checking on the wellbeing of the ponies which are regularly lent to FOTT by a local farmer to graze different areas of the Towans. And people are always welcome to join FOTT's satellite groups, Save Our Sand – which organises regular beach cleans – and Friends of the Towans Art Club.

Sara praises the support she has had from FOTT's trustees and volunteers, and former Towans Ranger and founder of FOTT Martin Rule. She is keen to build on all they have achieved in the last 10 years. "I want to get people enthused about the dunes, and realise how special they are," she says.

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
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St Ives Archive: Remembering the father of Cornish folk music

In the early 1960s, a young folk singer began appearing regularly at the Mermaid Arts Centre in Fish Street, St Ives. Appropriately, he was known as John the Fish: the nickname came about because at that time, he was a fisherman working out of Newlyn. The man born Peter John Langford soon became a popular figure on the Cornish folk music scene.

John was raised in Edmonton, London, and became a fan of early jazz and blues. Informal guitar lessons from a friend gave him confidence to perform at parties and later join an amateur London skiffle band. In his mid-20s he was working for Remington, the electric shaver company (somewhat ironic – see his picture!) until he became disillusioned



with London and was tempted down to Cornwall by a friend to try fishing.

The Graveyard, a cellar underneath a cafe in Morrab Road, Penzance, was one of his first gigs, followed by other local pubs such as the Turk's Head, and later the regular folk nights in St Ives at the Mermaid (previously Tucker's lemonade and pop factory). When John met local builder and country and western fan Tel Mann, the guitar/singing duo John and Tel was formed, and they were invited to play the opening of the Count House, a new venue on the remote cliffs of Botallack in the summer of 1964.

The Count House's co-owner Ian Todd had run an espresso coffee bar/jazz club in Derby, and moved



to St Ives in 1959 with his wife Judi Rea, who had known the area as an evacuee. He worked in the Picnic Box cafe opposite St Ives Arts Club (now Blas Burgerworks), and later formed the printing company which published How to Spot a Beatnik, the famous cartoon guide by local artist Cedric Rogers in 1963. The following year, Ian and his business partner John Wood bought Botallack House, an old mine count house, along with various outbuildings. Old chapel benches and fishing net decorations were installed in the former workshop, and the Count House was born in June 1964, with John the Fish and Tel Mann performing. It soon became Cornwall's premier folk club.

John the Fish's fame rose with that of the Count House, and he appeared on several recordings, many as part of a very successful duo with Brenda Wootton. Music always remained part of his life, but he was involved in many more things, including founding Cornwall Humanists and becoming a celebrant. In 2018, more than 50 years after he first performed in St Ives, John the Fish came to the Arts Club, and Tony Mason's film of him being interviewed by Toni Carver that night can be found on YouTube. He died at the age of 87 in January this year.

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

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Keeping the heat in and the cold out

Making sure conservatories stays warm during the winter can be a challenge, as they generally contain a lot of windows and very little insulation. There are several strategies that may help you contain the heat and make your conservatory more comfortable during the cooler months:

- Check for any gaps in the walls, floors, or ceiling and around windows and doors. You can use draft excluders, weatherstripping, or caulk to make sure the conservatory is sealed to prevent drafts and consequent heat loss.
- The simplest solution is to use blankets or throws for extra warmth. You can buy electric heated blankets to use when sitting in your conservatory.
- Make sure you close any ventilation shafts at night. Don't permanently seal them, it's important to allow fresh air in occasionally to ventilate the space. You also need this option to control the temperature during warmer months.
- Consider upgrading your conservatory windows, if they are not already double-glazed, as this helps reduce heat loss. Triple-glazing is an even more efficient way to trap heat in your conservatory.
- If your conservatory has a polycarbonate or glass roof, consider adding a layer of good insulation. You could install insulation boards or line the roof with panels or blinds.
- Insulate your windows and doors with thick or thermal-lined curtains or blinds. Close these in the evenings to trap the heat and prevent drafts.
- Consider underfloor heating, which could provide a consistent and efficient source of heat for your conservatory. This could be electric or water-based and would heat the room evenly from the ground up.



- Alternatively, using rugs and carpets can help insulate the floor and make the space feel warmer underfoot.
- If you have a central heating system, you could consider installing traditional radiators to provide supplemental heating. Ensure they are the appropriate size for the space.
- Electric space heaters are portable and can quickly provide warmth. Make sure you use an energy-efficient model with adjustable thermostats. Never leave heaters unattended.
- Consider installing a conservatory heater that can be wall-mounted or placed on the floor. These are usually the most energy-efficient type of heat source as they are specifically designed to heat this type of space.
- An air source heat pump may be an investment but it will provide a long-term solution, efficiently heating and cooling your conservatory by transferring heat from the outside air.

All of these approaches will depend on your budget, and how you use your conservatory. Remember to monitor the temperature and make adjustments as needed to maintain a comfortable environment, but also take into account energy efficiency and the rising cost of heating. Using a combination of these strategies could be the most effective way to keep your conservatory warm during the winter and reduce your energy consumption.

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Property: Mortgage affordability 'still incredibly stretched'

The UK residential homes sales market remains challenging, says the Royal Institute of Chartered Surveyors (RICS), and with interest rates staying higher than their long-standing low point over the past few years, one can see why.

Its report shows interest rates continuing to hamper mortgage affordability, and the disparity between tightening lettings supply and rising demand causing rental price rises. New buyer enquiries were down 39% in September, a marginal improvement on August.

September results for agreed sales remain down. For the coming three months, estate agents are envisaging a decline in sales volumes. Twelve-month sales expectations are low, but stable. House prices remain on a downward trajectory at the national level. In the South West, the average price of a home is £328,413, according to HM Land Registry. Near-term expectations point to a further price pull-back over the next three months, with little change envisaged 12 months down the line.

"With mortgage affordability still incredibly stretched, it is unsurprising that buyer activity



across the housing market remained subdued in September," said Tarrant Parsons, senior economist at the RICS. "Although the decision to pause monetary policy tightening a few weeks ago provided a glimmer of relief for the market, interest rates are likely now set to remain on hold for a prolonged period.

"As such, it appears there is little prospect of trends deviating much from the recent picture in the immediate future. That said, the outlook a little further ahead has improved slightly, with 12-month sales expectations moving out of negative territory for the first time in several reports."

'Aparthotels' scheme gets turned down


Local views won the day when a planning application to convert 37 newly-completed apartments, on the site of the former Cottage Hotel in Carbis Bay, into an 'aparthotel' scheme, was turned down by Cornwall Council.

The scheme had been recommended for approval, but the plan was voted against following speeches by local councillors Johnnie Wells, Linda Taylor, and Andrew Mitchell.

There were concerns that the application did not support the St Ives neighbourhood plan policy for permanent homes. It was also argued that the aparthotel concept was unclear, and it was difficult to see how conditions to prevent the properties being occupied as self-contained flats could be enforced in the future.

Cllr Wells, mayor of St Ives, questioned why the developer had sought to market the properties at such high prices. He also argued that with 700 holiday properties in Carbis Bay there was no evidence of need for more accommodation of this kind, but a pressing need for permanent homes.
