# Kite Fest: Let's bring in the spring!

There's something special about St Ives in spring. Clear, expansive skies and fresh sea air. As the clocks go forward and we leap into a new season, it's the ideal time to blow away the cobwebs and embrace the elements with a fun, free activity for all – St Ives Kite Fest is back for 2024!

Revived by St Ives Town Council in 2022, this annual community event lead by the cultural services team, are thrilled to be working alongside 'Dr Kite' Billy Wynter, and also local art teacher Laura Peach, who runs the weekly St Ives Library Art Club, to deliver this year's event.



"I've yet to meet anyone who doesn't like flying or watching kites dance in the sky!" said Cultural Services Manager Emma Gibson. "The use of recycled and of sustainable materials is key to our approach of kitemaking. We have our fingers crossed for fine flying weather, and will be holding our breath to see if we can get our kites up in the air!

"There are various ways people can get involved. Thanks to funding provided by Feast and St Ives Community Fund, Laura Peach will be holding workshops in three local schools with new kite designs, and we have our public Making Workshops with Dr Kite at the Library on Saturday 23rd March. Or if making is not your thing, you can simply come along – with or without a kite – to Flight Day,



between 1pm and 3pm at the island on Saturday 30th March. We really hope everyone will see this as a chance to get together to celebrate our community and the town."

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# St Ives Farmers' Market: Settling in at the Island Centre

Last autumn was a time of change for St Ives Farmers' Market, when it moved from its long -standing location in the Guildhall to a temporary new home across town at the Island Centre.



The move followed the start of St Ives Town Council's major Guildhall Renewal Project, which is scheduled for completion in the spring of 2025.

Farmers' Market treasurer Mark Floyd said: "The town council supported us in finding this new venue, which is run by them. It's handy for visitors, as it's next to the Island car park. And as the market is now on Mondays, rather than Thursdays, it's a good time to do the weekly shop, whether you're a local or you're here on holiday." The market, says Mark, will continue to be "a celebration of local, seasonal produce". As well as his own Herland Roots greengrocer stall, he runs the deli, which sells Cornish cheeses, Cornish Sea Salt's ever-expanding range, and locally-produced fermented products such as sauerkraut and kimchi.

Among the other stalls are Cath's Cornish Kitchen's award-winning bread and quiches, fresh fish from Quayside Fish, honey from Rosewarne





Apiary and home-made jams from Kyfyth Kernow (that's Cornish Preserves in English). The market is also the place to go for hand-made jewellery, soap, art, gifts, locally-grown plants and more. And as Mark says, the market also has scope to grow.

St Ives Farmers' Market is open from 9.30am to 2pm at the Island Centre every Monday. See the market Facebook page for up-to-date information each week.

# Recipe: Blueberry and vanilla baked cheesecake

It's time to treat Mum this Mother's Day, and this nice easy dessert should really impress her, says resident St Ives Local chef Danny Rouncefield, AKA The Cornish Chef. He will be hosting a Mothering Sunday roast dinner at Baker & Chef. at



6 River Street, Truro, on 10th March – mothers get a free dessert! You'll need to book – look up @bakerandcheftruro online.

#### **INGREDIENTS**

300g digestive biscuits
150g melted butter
280g golden castor sugar
130g blueberries
1tsp cornflour
3 x 300g packs of full-fat cream cheese
4tbsp plain flour
3tsp vanilla extract
3 large eggs
200ml pot soured cream

#### **METHOD**

Preheat oven to  $200^{\circ}$ c/ $180^{\circ}$ c fan/gas 6. Line a 20 x 30cm rectangular tin with baking parchment. Put the biscuits in a food processor and blitz to a fine crumb. Add the butter and blitz again to combine. Tip into the tin, press down firmly with the back of a spoon to cover the base, then bake for 10 mins. Leave to cool.

Meanwhile, tip 25g of the sugar and the blueberries into a small pan. Mix the cornflour with 1 tbsp cold water and add this to the pan. Heat gently until the sugar dissolves. Increase



the heat and bubble for 1–2 mins until saucy. Set aside to cool.

In a large bowl, whisk the cream cheese with an electric hand-held whisk until smooth. Add the remaining sugar and whisk again. Add the flour, vanilla, eggs, and soured cream, and whisk until smooth and well combined.

Pour half the cheesecake mixture over the biscuit base, then spoon half the blueberry sauce on top in small blobs. Cover with the remaining cheesecake mix and smooth the surface with a spatula. Drizzle the remaining blueberry sauce over the top, then use the end of the spoon to ripple it into the cheesecake. Bake for 10 mins, then lower the heat to 110°c/90°c fan and bake for a further 30 mins. Turn off the oven and leave the cheesecake inside for 1 hr, then leave for 1 hour more with the door ajar. Finally, leave at room temperature until completely cool, then chill for at least 3 hours.

# Capturing the Light at St Ives Museum

St Ives Museum's latest exhibition explores the period prior to 1914, when the St Ives art colony gained a national and international reputation as a centre for the practice and teaching of landscape and marine painting out of doors.

The exhibition, Capturing the Light: St Ives Artists 1885–1914, showcases some of the leading British and foreign artists drawn to what was hailed as "the Mecca of the seascapist", many of whom experienced career-changing influences.

For 2024, the museum will have a significantly expanded display of fabrics and clothing manufactured at the Crysede Factory on the Island in the 1920s and 1930s. The display showcases the wonderful patterns and designs created by Crysede, many of which reflect local themes and locations. There will also be a new display about the world-famous Troika Pottery, which began life in what is now the museum building at Wheal Dream in 1963 and remained there until it moved to Newlyn in 1970.

Assistant curator Peter Garratt said: "2024 is a very significant year for the museum, as it was founded in 2024 by members of the Old Cornwall Society. To celebrate our 100th birthday, we are creating a centenary trail which will feature displays at a number of

locations around the town which celebrate notable events and activities on St Ives history. There will also be a programme of fundraising events, talks and entertainment. Full details will be published shortly."

St Ives Museum re-opens on 1st April, and is then open Monday to Friday from 10.30am to 4.30pm and Saturdays from 10.30am to 3.30pm until the end of October. Admission is £5 – free for children under 5.

# A new show from seven artists who met in St Ives

The seven artists of the MAC | RAGS Art Collective are returning to the Crypt Gallery in April, to celebrate their continuing connection with St Ives.

Mary Scott, Andrew Rothwell, Rosanna Gardner, Anna Clarke, Gwynne Penny, Sue Emms and Nick Strivens were all part of the St Ives School of Painting Porthmeor Programme in 2020. The programme took pace remotely during lockdown, but the group came together from different parts of the country for regular weekends in St Ives. All the artists have their own personal connection with the town, and each of them has found that it has shaped their artistic journey. The importance of the Cornish coastline to their work is reflected in this year's exhibition title, Ebb and Flow

The name MAC | RAGS was inspired partly by the artists' initials, partly because of having to put on their macs when it was very wet as they were out painting, and partly by the rags that some of them painted with!

Ebb and Flow opens on Saturday, 13th April, from 2pm, in The Crypt Gallery, beneath the Mariners Church, between The Wharf and Norway Square. It will be open daily, from 10am-6pm, closing on 19th April at 3pm. Entry is free and there will be original work for sale.

Mary Scott paints intuitively, her work emerging as abstract recollections of long walks on the Cornish coast and from travels in other wild places. Mary was previously a geologist, and she would like those viewing her art to slow down and connect with geological time and the fragility of our planet.

Gwynne Penny draws inspiration from the shoreline around St Ives Bay. She is fascinated by the ever-changing inter-tidal zone, and Porthmeor Beach and the Island have been the main subject of her work in recent years. Gwynne's paintings and sculptures encapsulate her experiences and observations of this unique environment.

Anna Clarke's work is inspired by her love of the open sea, being especially connected to the coast of St Ives and Salcombe from years of family holidays; both places inspire her with their ever-changing iteration of texture, pattern and wondrous colour.

Rosanna Gardner is particularly interested in St Ives' history – St Ives Museum is one of her favourite places and she has drawn inspiration from early photographs and maps. For Ebb and Flow, Rosanna has made oil pastel studies of the

sea: the eddies and swirls, incoming waves and outgoing currents suggesting abstract compositions.

Andrew Rothwell paints to see things more clearly. Simplifying form and playing with colour is his way of expressing his feelings towards a place, person, or scene. In so many aspects of life, we are the servant of others – in art you make all the decisions – for better or worse!

**Sue Emms** trained as a dress designer, and latterly has moved over to painting. Over the years she has spent time honing her skills. There is a depth to the work and a richness. She is interested in the human form, and likes to show this in her work.

Nick Striven's art is influenced by Exmoor, where he lives, and the South West coast. He paints largely landscapes and seascapes; occasionally abstract art and industrial landscapes. Nick's art doesn't follow any rules: he is selftaught, with the benefit of occasional workshops.

# Colour and Movement at the Leach Pottery

Leach Pottery's 2024 exhibition programme has kicked off with the group show Colour and Movement. which runs until 19th May. The exhibition celebrates contemporary and emerging potters who work with colour, flowing decoration, and lively movement. Expect pots with a sense of freedom and energy - and some are available to purchase.

Dylan Bowen makes slip-decorated earthenware using both traditional and contemporary materials and techniques. He works on a small but ever-mutating range of shapes, large platters, bowls, and more sculptural forms.

Heather Gibson makes a range of handbuilt ceramic stoneware, including large chargers, carved vessels, and tableware. Exploring clay as a canvas for trace, memory, and mark-making, she uses a careful alchemy of slips, oxides, and glazes to create bold, sculptural, and dynamic pieces.

Dawn Hajittofi throws vessels in white earthenware, then alters and marks the

surfaces with various indentations, sometimes adding pieces to the surface. She decorates using coloured slips, oxides, glazes, and underglazes.

Jennifer Hall works from her home studio overlooking the sea on the north coast of Pembrokeshire. Using a geared kickwheel, she throws domestic ware in small batches. She decorates her pots with slips and oxides, using a combination of slip trailing, brushwork and sgraffito techniques.

Tarragon Smith is a Canadian-born ceramicist, now living in Norfolk. The wave motif that can be found in varying guises on much of his work is a catch-all for distance, loss, and migration, which carries both political and personal significance.

# What Lies Beneath: a raw study of Cornwall

Tina Hill, and Liz and Dominic Hewitt, three West Country artists who share a passion for both the physicality and emotion of the Cornish landscape, are showing for the first time in the Crypt Gallery.

What Lies Beneath runs from 10th-15th March, with a preview evening on 9th March, from 4pm-7pm, to which all are welcome. The exhibition is the result of many years

exploring the paths, beaches, and archaeological and industrial sites of Cornwall. The artists have distilled their experiences into a visual archive using mixed media, painting, print, textile art, and photography.

Tina is inspired by archaeology, geology, and museum artefact – the marks and stains of time. For this exhibition she is showing both paintings and unique mixed media prints that are inspired by and conceived in Cornwall, often using pigments sourced from the Cornish land itself.

In this exhibition, Liz is documenting the marks left on the Cornish Landscape by the tin mining industry, with rust printed papers, mixed media collage, prints, and handmade books. The cloth and paper used has been coloured and stained with rust and earth pigments collected from walks along the coastal paths and beaches, leaving an impression of past times.

Dominic is fascinated by the remnants of our industrial past – the discarded, the decaying, and the rusted. In his photographs he enhances the colours to reveal their underlying beauty, their texture, and form, giving us alternative and deeper insights into what is left behind. His work follows the decline of the mining and fishing industries in Cornwall and beyond.

# Emma Jeffryes, By The Sea, at New Craftsman

St Ives artist Emma Jeffryes is returning to the New Craftsman Gallery with a new collection of work entitled By The Sea. The show combines key influences from recent years into one comprehensive and definitive collection for 2024.

As always, St Ives and the surrounding ocean figure strongly in this exhibition, beginning with Emma's first artwork of this year, January Sea, painted en plein air on Porthmeor Beach on a bitterly cold day, as well as Tea, Tate, Town, inspired by the view from the Tate St Ives café – which is on the cover of this issue of St Ives Local.

Emma's studies of the South West Coast Path, which she has been walking in sections over the past few years, also form part of this collection, taking in Hawkes Point and other spectacular views of the Cornish coast.

Last August, Emma spent a week in Falmouth in order to paint the Tall Ships Regatta. Sadly, this world famous event was cancelled at the last minute, due to the arrival of Storm Betty, and so the works Emma made there, from a little terrace just above the sea, depict the lives of Falmouth's sea-going folk, from

swimmers and paddle boarders, to fishing boats, sailing yachts, and huge military ships, along with Tall Ships anchored patiently in the harbour during unusually stormy conditions. All these works continue Emma's lifelong study of our powerful connection with the sea, and how this, in turn, has affected the nature of Cornwall's coastline.

The exhibition also includes a series of Emma's still life works, from vases of flowers to everyday objects around her studio, which demonstrate her talent for bright complimentary colour and lively compositions.

By The Sea is at the New Craftsman Gallery, in Fore Street, St Ives, from 30th March to 26th April.

# St Ives Archive is coming to town!

Last year, St Ives Town Council approached the Trustees of St Ives Archive and offered them a permanent home – Market House in Market Place. It is a perfect partnership, enabling the guardians of St Ives history to breathe life once again into this important building, which was Grade II listed in 1972.

Market House has been the home of commerce and administration in St Ives since 1490. The original building was made of wood, with an open ground floor which provided a sheltered area for trading. In 1832 this building was demolished and replaced by the larger granite building that exists today. The rounded ends of Market House, which gives the building such a distinctive shape, were designed for a specific purpose: they allowed space for carts carrying ships' masts to and from the harbour to negotiate the tight corners of St Ives' streets.

The first floor of the new Market House became the Town Hall, and was both the St Ives Town Council chamber and the Magistrates Court, until the new Guildhall was built in Street an Pol and the Municipal Offices relocated there in 1940.

Since it was founded in 1996, St Ives Archive has never had a permanent home. Wesley Methodist Church in Carbis Bay is its third location, and to move back into St Ives was always the aim of the Archive. So when the Archive Trustees were approached by the town council with the offer to move into the first floor of Market House, they were delighted to accept. The proposal is subject to raising the necessary funding, with the aim of completion in 2025. Applications for a St Ives Enterprise grant and the Government's Community Ownership Fund are being prepared.

Archive volunteers were the first members of the public to have an escorted tour of the premises. An Open Day hosted by the Archive was held on 15th December, and the response from the many visitors

was overwhelmingly positive towards the move. On 28th March 2024, from 10am until 3pm, St Ives Archive will once again open the doors of Market House for a second Open Day, with the co-operation of the town council.

It will be an opportunity to see the historic first floor – complete with the ceremonial chair and cells – before it is closed for renovation. Refreshments will be available, and Archive publications will be on sale. Volunteers will be there to give information and answer questions about the Archive, and also to extend a warm welcome to any prospective volunteers. Volunteers are the lifeblood of the Archive, and each one is valued for their commitment, time and skills at every level. This is an exciting time to join the team of enthusiastic volunteers, and to experience being part of this unique project of relocation and the creation of a new Heritage and Study Centre.

Spring is in the air - and on the ground

After the muted months of winter, the wildlife of the Towans is waking from winter dormancy. If you tune into your senses, you'll notice the gradual changes that herald spring – the swelling of buds on bushes and trees; the unfurling of fresh leaves; the change in birdsong as it becomes vibrant and spirited; and the gentle buzz of foraging insects taking advantage of a burst of warm sunshine.

This can be one of the best times of year for wildlife-watching, as animals become more active, gathering food and materials in preparation for breeding. There is something very special about a chance wildlife encounter – where you're so quiet and unobtrusive that the animals don't even know you're there, and you get to watch them going about their daily lives in their natural environment.



Wheatears are one of the earliest migrating birds to pass through the Towans in the spring. These little birds spend the winter in Africa, and then head back to Britain to breed, using the Towans as an important refuelling stop before continuing their journey north. The reason for the name Wheatear – old English for white arse! – becomes apparent when you see its white rump as it flies away. We'll see them again in September when they make their return journey. It can also be a surprise to see a shelduck disappearing into a sand dune – less so once you find out that they use old rabbit holes as nest sites. Meadow pipits and skylarks also nest on the ground, and all these birds are easily disturbed by energetic dogs eager to explore.



As the days become warmer, native wildlife such as adders and lizards start to wake from their winter hibernation. Being cold blooded animals, they're not able to fully regulate their body temperature, and rely on heat from the sun, ground and air to keep them warm. On warm spring days, they often bask in the sun on areas of bare ground or short grass. They're naturally shy animals and prefer to move away to the safety of undergrowth at the slightest sign of danger. However, on cooler days, they're not able to move away quickly, and that's when they're more likely to try to defend themselves, and could give your dog a nip.

So, next time you're out on the Towans, keep your eyes and ears open, and pause if you spot any wildlife. You can give them a helping hand by allowing them time and space to move away. By having your dog on a lead or under close control, you can help keep both the dog and other creatures safe – you could be rewarded with a great view of the wonderful wildlife of the Towans!

Friends of the Towans practical conservation sessions run every Thursday from 10am to 2pm, with a weekend session on Sunday 17th March from 10.30am to 2.30pm. You don't need any specific experience to join, and we provide training, tools and biscuits. You're welcome to come just for an hour or two and bring family and friends too! 

# St Ives Community Land Trust: Full steam ahead for affordable homes project

Our plans to provide six affordable rental flats for local people at the Old Vicarage Flats took a leap forward at the start of the year. After agreeing redevelopment funding from St Ives Town Deal, we were able to start the final stage of our community project.

The £570,000 needed to acquire the Old Vicarage Flats was raised by the community some years ago, and work began to replace the huge mansard roof, remove asbestos and seek planning permission for redevelopment.



The latest stage has been to restructure the internal layout of the building, to create two one-bedroom flats and four two-bedroom flats. Allocation will be strictly limited to applicants with strong long-term local connections to the parish of St Ives. Full details of the application process will not be available for some months, as the building needs a great deal of work – as you can see from these images. Local construction company Chard Builders have been removing some internal walls, and the materials have been separated, ready to go for recycling.

We are introducing improved structural elements and increasing insulation levels, whilst maintaining and restoring the beautiful façade of this Georgian building. Built in 1832 as The Vicarage, it has been



a much-loved building for almost 200 years. It was used for accommodation and later as a community room.

We are always interested to hear your stories and memories from the past, and how the space was used – it has been a nursery, Sunday School, celebration venue, and of course, home to many people over the years. Do share your photographs and memories with the Trust.




#### Inflation and rate relief
