

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

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## 200th anniversary RNLI scroll arrives

Local members of the RNLI have taken part in the charity's Connecting Our Communities event, marking its 200th anniversary.

The event sees a scroll, bearing the RNLI pledge, being passed through communities around the UK and Ireland. It is signed by representatives at each location.

The pledge reads: "Whoever we are, wherever we are from, we are one crew, ready to save lives. We're powered by passion, talent, and kindness, like generations of selfless lifesavers before us. This is our watch, we lead the way, valuing each other, trusting each other, depending on one another, volunteering to face the storm together. Knowing that, with courage, nothing is impossible. That is what has always driven us to save every

one we can. It's what makes every one of us a lifesaver."

At St Ives lifeboat station, the scroll was signed by coxswain Rob Cocking, fundraising chair Chris Salway, RNLI shop manager Emileen Williams, lifeboat operations manager James Perkin, and water safety adviser Mick Poynter. The pledge is written in seven languages, including Cornish.

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## Food Festival update and how St Ives BID is focusing on sustainability

AS mentioned last issue, the St Ives Food and Drink Festival will not go ahead this May.

But St Ives BID has confirmed that the event will return in May 2025, with a community interest company (CIC) in the organiser's seat. The CIC will be looking at various fundraising activities before the next festival, and you can follow progress at stivesfoodanddrinkfestival.co.uk "The new Food and Drink Festival will focus very much on local and Cornish businesses, artisan producers, community groups, and local entertainers," said BID. The Business Investment District Group is currently focusing on sustainability and is now taking a pilot scheme forward as it begin a new term, helping to drive local business forward, from 1st July. The scheme offers sustainable, reusable, branded 120z coffee cups which can be uased across multiple outlets around town. "Our Circular&Co Cup is designed to last for over ten years and it's important that people feel proud carrying our branded cup



and happy to use it time and again," said BID. "As one of the UK's most popular holiday destinations, St Ives sells a vast amount of hot and cold drinks, the majority of which are served in recyclable but single-use takeaway vessels. For residents and visitors who prefer their drink on the go, St Ives is introducing a new affordable way of becoming part of the reusable movement."

The cups cost £2 and you get a 10% discount on your drink. ## The secret gardens to be found in the heart of St Ives

The ever-popular Secret Gardens of St Ives event takes place over the weekend of 22nd and 23rd June, from 1pm to 5pm.

This year's route stretches from Hain Walk
— where four gardens will open their gates
— across to the Belyars, and on to the top
part of town.

Here, a variety of gardens will open, from a small terrace in Tom's Yard to the grounds of the Old Vicarage, before dipping back towards the town centre to gardens with views out over the bay. Tickets are valid for both days — which may help those who do not have the energy to complete the whole route in one afternoon!

As ever, the event is organised by, and supports, the St Ives Community Fund, a local charity which provides swift help for those in need, as well as supporting community projects. This year, the fund is splitting proceeds with the worthwhile St Ives Foodshare, which is based at St John's Church. St Ives Foodshare runs a toddlers' group with lunch, a skills share club, and daily waste food distribution. It also provides evening social meals, as well as weekly meal distributions to homes.



## Boost for the St Ives Mariners Memorial Project



Limited edition miniatures of a sculpture designed to celebrate the maritime history of St Ives are now available at Penwith Gallery.

The mariners, fishermen, and boatbuilders of St Ives provided many early artists with their inspiration, and at the end of the 19th century, St Ives was the fourth largest port in the British Isles by weight of fish landed. The St Ives Mariners Memorial Project aims to create a lasting symbol of this history.

In collaboration with renowned local sculptor Tom Leaper, the project aims to fund the installation of a life-size bronze sculpture depicting two pilchard fishermen 'tucking the net'.

The maquettes are each priced at £1,400, and the proceeds will fund the casting, production, and installation of the main sculpture, which will be sited on the 'Castle', near the entrance to Smeaton's Pier. Anyone who buys a maquette will have their name inscribed on the side of the sculpture.





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## St Ives Farmers' Market: Buy Fudge

#### A chat with fudge maker Andrew Mortimer

#### How did you come up with the name **Buy Fudge?**

I was looking for a business name, and most of the good fudge ones were already taken! I just thought "Buy Fudge" was easy to remember!



#### Have you always been a fudge fan?

I grew up in Fowey, and I remember always wanting to go into the fudge shops! I have a huge love for cooking, and I've been making fudge for family and friends for about 10 years. In 2022 I had my first stall at Charlestown Christmas Market. I had a number of other events booked in December, and I thought I'd made enough for all of them but I sold out in a day and a half!

Do you have a background in catering? I've done various jobs, including being a police officer, like my dad and grandad, but I realised it wasn't for me. After several years in Buckinghamshire, I returned to Cornwall and worked in various commercial kitchens – I've cooked burgers for hundreds of people at once!

#### What makes your fudge distinctive?

Because I'm so passionate about fudge, I want it to be authentic, traditional and hand-made like your mum or grandmother would have made. Fudge is made by mixing sugar and dairy, basically. I started with other people's recipes, and then I designed my own recipe and spent a lot of time perfecting it. I don't use condensed milk, just Cornish clotted cream, demerara sugar and natural ingredients, with no artificial flavourings, I describe my fudge is "inspired by nature, made by the sea". It's artisan and small batch. I source all my ingredients locally where I can, and my packaging is compostable.

#### Can you describe some of the flavours in your range?

I've made many exotic flavours over the years, and I love trying new ideas - that's how the Marmite flavour came about! I also do Easter




egg, Christmas cake, elderberry, lavender, caramelised walnut and coffee, and lion's mane mushroom and lemon. For the rum and raisin. I use real rum, so it's quite boozy, and so is the Baileys! I also do a few traditional flavours. The first fudge I ever made was Cornish clotted cream and sea salt, which won a silver Taste of the West award in January this year. I didn't expect to win anything.

#### What are your plans for the business now?

I'm ramping up production ready for the summer. Then from October, nearly all my time will be spent making fudge for November and December. I'm hoping to expand the range with some more unusual flavours, and to sell to hotels and other businesses. At Christmas, I'll have someone to help me on the stall, and I would love to be able to employ someone to help me at other times. At the moment, I make all the fudge myself in my kitchen, and it's a hard and hot job!

But you clearly enjoy running a fudge business! I love hearing people's responses to eating my fudge - It makes me happy to see them being happy. I've met people who've become friends, not just customers.

## A trip back in time marks a special anniversary for St Ives Museum

St Ives Museum is celebrating its centenary with the creation of a self-guided walk designed to highlight the town's fascinating history. There are 16 stops on the Centenary Town Trail, each focusing on a specific event or an aspect of the heritage of St Ives, which together cover every decade since the museum first opened in 1924.

These include the VE Day celebrations of 1945; HMS Wave running aground off Westcotts Quay in 1952; and the opening of Tate St Ives in 1993. The trail was officially launched by Nev Meek, president of the Federation of Old Cornwall Societies, who described the creation of the collections at St Ives Museum over a period of 100 years as "a wonderful achievement". He said it was always a pleasure to come to St Ives, birthplace of the Old Cornwall movement. The president was welcomed by St Ives mayor Johnnie Wells, who said the museum was a fascinating place. "I learn something new every time I come here," he said. The date of the launch was 10th April – anniversary of the birth in 1873 of Robert Morton Nance, co-founder of both St Ives Museum and St Ives Old Cornwall Society and Grand Bard of Gorsedh Kernow. In the 1920s, he and fellow founder members of the Old Cornwall Society began collecting artefacts and objects which were in danger of disappearing, as traditional industries such as fishing, farming and mining began to change and die out. Their aim was to 'gather the fragments that are left that nothing be lost,". This first collection was housed in a cellar below a sail loft in Pudding Bag Lane, but the collection grew larger, and eventually the museum was moved to its current location in Wheal Dream, overlooking Bamaluz beach.

Peter Garratt, assistant curator at the museum and organiser of the Centenary Town Trail, said: "We are very fortunate to live in a place with such a rich heritage, and promoting the range and quality of our collection is a fitting way to celebrate our 100th anniversary.


"We know how proud the town is of its museum, and we were delighted by the co-operation from local businesses who agreed to host the 16 stops on the trail, We have great stories to tell, and hopefully seeing the trail at so many different locations will encourage visitors to come and find out more at the museum. We also have a wonderful new art exhibition this year called Capturing the Light, covering the period 1885 to 1914, as well as new displays of Cryséde dresses and Troika pottery."



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# The changing seasons in St Ives, at Porthgwidden and Porthmeor

As I write this in April, we're enduring relentless rain, so I have everything crossed that you're reading this on a warm, dry spring day! Despite the weather, patio season is in full swing at Trevena Cross, and May and June promise colour bursting from every bench.

From Geraniums to Begonia Semperflorens, Verbenas to Impatiens, Argyranthemums to Bidens, Petunias to Marigolds, there is a plant and colour to suit every pot, trough, basket, bed and border, in every garden. All our patio plants are grown on site in the nursery, which ensures they remain very economical buys, at less than 97p per plant (£3.85 per pack). Many of them promise colour well into winter, too, assuming they avoid heavy frosts!

Perennials are also travelling en masse from the nursery to the garden centre now, along with plenty of spring and early summer flowering shrubs and trees. As we head into summer, plenty more 'ready planted' pots and baskets become available at the centre, ready to provide instant impact to outside spaces. These are convenient buys for those without the time, confidence, or inclination to plant up their own.





Having said that, the team at Trevena Cross are always on hand to offer expert planting advice, and a confidence boost, alongside the exceptional plants they have nurtured from seed or cutting. And there are lots of bargains to be had, with half-price plant benches promising plenty of regularly-changing treats and tempting buys.

Trevena Cross also has some new outdoor living range options, with pieces not available in previous years. It has been so satisfying to embrace the 'grow your own' concept, and deliver 'land to plate', daily – the freshest produce possible! The team – and customers – are also loving the newly-opened outdoor tiki hut, which offers quicker takeaway options for customers to enjoy on the go or in the outside undercover seating area – bliss!

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

## Out on the Towans

Springing into summer

As we head into late spring and early summer the Towans are truly springing to life with a riot of colour, as the wildflowers burst into flower and butterflies emerge.

Look out for the distinctive pyramidal orchid – with its bright pink pyramid–shaped flower spike, it's a beautiful burst of colour, and fairly easy to see once you start looking. The rare silver–studded blue butterfly is another treat to see – a beautiful flash of blue as they flutter about their business.

Another favourite of mine is hearing the distinctive call of the skylarks. These birds can have up to four broods a year, and because they make their nests on the ground in grassy areas, they are easily disturbed by inquisitive and enthusiastic dogs. If you're out with your dog at this time of year, you can help nesting skylarks by keeping your dog close to you so they're less likely to run ahead and scare these enigmatic birds. Adders, with their distinctive black zigzag marking down their back, are another reason to keep your dog close by. As I mentioned last time, these reptiles, along with lizards, often bask in the sun on short grass or bare ground in spring, and have been known to bite dogs if they feel threatened.



Over the autumn and winter our practical conservation sessions have focused on cutting scrub – woody bushes and trees, such as gorse and blackthorn. On these sessions, volunteers have



carried out over 400 hours of conservation work, including cutting over 550 square metres of scrub at sites on Gwithian Towans and St Gothian Sands – a great achievement! Reducing scrub cover allows more light in and encourages the dune grassland plants to regenerate, creating a better balance of wildflowers, bare ground, insects and other wildlife.

With the change in seasons there will be a change in focus to our activities. We'll be doing less hands-on practical conservation work, and spending more time looking at the amazing plants and wildlife of the Towans. We'll be running a mix of guided walks looking at the different types of wild creatures, carrying out survey work at specific areas of the Towans and recording what we find there, along with running occasional practical conservation sessions. There are also regular monthly beach cleans, organised by Save our Sand, a sub-group of Friends of the Towans.

## Recipe: Mackerel fillets with an Asian salad and honey-soy dressing

Resident St Ives Local chef Danny Rouncefield, AKA The Cornish Chef, is back. "This recipe is more to show you how to get the best cookery on a fillet of fish, and that it shouldn't be a scary thing to cook," says Danny. "With a few simple tips, you can cook fish like the professionals."

#### **INGREDIENTS**

4 medium mackerel fillets
1/4 red cabbage
1 carrot
50g coriander
1/2 cucumber
1 red onion
1 bunch spring onions
50ml soy sauce
50ml olive oil
1tsp honey
1/2 lime for garnish
20g butter
Good quality sea salt
Cracked black pepper

#### METHOD

For the salad, finely shred the red cabbage. Taking a few of the leaves at a time will help to make slicing finer. Grate the carrot. Roughly chop the coriander — you don't want to go too fine as this will bruise the leaf, so keep it quite coarse. Cut the cucumber into quarters lengthways. Remove the seeds, just leaving the firm part, and slice on the diagonal to get thin strips. Peel and halve the red onion and slice. Remove any dead leaves from the outside of the spring onions and cut on the diagonal, much like the cucumber.

Toss everything together in a bowl. For the dressing, whisk the soy sauce and honey together while drizzling in the olive oil. Leave in the fridge until it is needed. Cut the lime into thirds ready for garnishing. Cookery of fish can be daunting, but with a few simple steps and tricks it can be simple. This method will work for any fillet or portion of fish.



First, you want to lay the fillets skin side down on some kitchen roll. This will help to create a crispier skin. Find a pan where all the fillets fit without touching each other or going up the sides. If you have to, use 2 pans as it will make the cookery easier. Preheat the pan to a medium high heat and drizzle a little olive oil. Once the oil starts to shimmer you know it is ready. One at a time, place the fillets skin side down into the pan ,holding them down for 5 or so seconds to stop them curling up. Once you see that it doesn't want to curl you can let go and repeat with the other fillets. Season the flesh side with good quality sea salt and cracked black pepper. Turn the pan down to a medium heat to have more control and time.

Starting with the first fillet you put in the pan, you should see the flesh start to change colour, going white. This will start from the outside of the fish and continue into the middle. You are looking for a small island in the centre of the mackerel that is still raw. At this point, starting with the first fillet that went into the pan, turn each one over. Add a small knob of butter and turn off the heat. Add a little pinch of salt to the skin for that extra crisp. The residual heat will melt the butter and finish cooking that last centre part without over-cooking the fish.

#### **TO SERVE**

Make a bed of the salad, drizzle with the dressing, and top with the mackerel and a fresh wedge of lime.

## Reaching for the Skies by Laura Tucker

Two local artists are generously opening their gardens for charity. Nick Williams and Caroline Marwood have strikingly similar stories. Both moved into properties with neglected gardens over 12 years ago and gradually embarked on a journey of discovery, hacking their way through the tangle of overgrown vegetation, sleeping-beauty style! Little by little the bones of the gardens were revealed and at the same time their enthusiasm for gardening took root. Neither had a master plan, rather both gardens developed organically. Nick and Caroline are now self-confessed obsessive gardeners. working from studios in their gardens, from which they draw inspiration. Their studios will be open along with the gardens.

The microclimate of Trelan, Nick's garden, allows him to grow a huge range of tropical plants, which have become Nick's great passion. Visitors will feel like they're in a luxuriant, jungle paradise. Reaching for the skies are the towering purple flower spikes of the Giant Echiums, which soar majestically 12-15 ft high. A natural amphitheatre has become the Sunken Garden, providing a calm, secluded space amongst the lush planting.

Tresithney, Caroline's garden, is steeped in history. Situated on St Michael's Way, the ancient pilgrimage footpath linking Lelant to St Michael's Mount and enjoying beautiful views up to Trencrom Hill, an Iron Age Hill Fort, this garden is definitely on the wild-side. Visitors will appreciate the sense that countless people have passed through this special place over the centuries. Caroline's garden has evolved naturally into separate areas; a series of granite paths meander through the Dell, there is a beautiful rose garden, a potager, fernery, vegetable & soft fruit areas.

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
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### Energy efficieny in Cornish homes can boost health and wellbeing

Homeowners in Cornwall can now apply for lower-cost loans to fund energy saving home improvements. The Green Home Improvement Scheme aims to fill the gaps for those who are ineligible for grants. Homeowners and private landlords can apply, however it is not open to owners of properties used as holiday lets or second homes.

Cornwall Council has appointed the Lendology CIC (community interest company) to run the pilot scheme, which has been funded by the Cornwall and Isles of Scilly Good Growth Fund. The Green Home





improvement Loans Scheme has received £518,254 from the UK Government through the UK Shared Prosperity Fund.

"Poor energy efficiency in homes can impact on health and wellbeing, as well as costing more to heat," said Olly Monk, Cornwall Council's cabint portfolio holder for housing. "Finding the money for improvements to make our homes more energy efficient, healthier to live in and cheaper to run is a problem for many.

With funding from the Shared Prosperity Fund we're able to introduce this pilot loan scheme to help residents pay for improvements which are costly to introduce but save money in the longer term.

"We want to help make Cornish homes warmer, healthier, more energy efficient and kinder to the planet."

In Cornwall half of homes do not have access to mains gas, and so most rely on oil, LPG or electric night storage heating. Many homes are not suitable for air source heat pumps without expensive energy efficiency measures. Housing across Cornwall contains a significant proportion of 'hard to treat' solid wall properties which are more difficult to insulate (there are estimates that 30% of all dwellings in Cornwall have solid walls). More than half of homes are also not connected to the mains gas supply and are therefore forced to rely on more expensive forms of heating.

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# St Ives Archive: Cornish folk who found fame

I am a member of the Archive's family history group, which helps people who come to ask us about their ancestors who originally came from the St Ives area, Some were fisherman who sailed to Ireland, where they met their future wives and brought them back to St Ives. Others achieved success far from home.

Sir John Quick was born at Trevail, Towednack, in 1852. Both his parents were called Quick, and his cousins lived in Trevessa Farm nearby. John left Cornwall at the age of two, when his family emigrated to Bendigo in the new colony of Victoria, Australia. Bendigo was the epicentre of a gold rush, which attracted many Cornish people. They built their own "Little Cornwall" community, so John grew up still among the Cornish. John attended Melbourne University before becoming a newspaper reporter, later going into law and politics, and eventually becoming a federal judge. After his death in1932, a fountain was erected in his memory in Bendigo, and a street was named after him. There is also a plaque near his birthplace in Towednack.

Rosamunde Scott was born in 1924 in the centre of three houses, called Chila Cita, in Abbey Hill in Lelant. She began writing when aged seven, and by the age of 18 had had her first short story published. She married Graham Hope Pilcher and they moved to Dundee, where she

continued writing stories for women's magazines. Her first novel as Rosamunde Pilcher was Secret to Tell in 1955, and she went on to enjoy international success with her books, many of her were centred around Porthkerris, her fictional name for St Ives.

The Archive also has information about famous people born elsewhere in Cornwall, such as Andrew Pears, from Mevagissey who went to London to open a hairdressing salon in the 1790s. He also produced soap with a gentle perfume, especially for ladies, and the business grew and prospered throughout the Victorian period, when the famous actress Lillie Langtry appeared in the company's advertising campaigns. Pears' Soap, now part of Lever Brothers, is still popular more than 200 years after it was created.

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


