For local folk and visitors alike, St Ives Farmers' Market is the place to shop this summer for vegetables, fruit and flowers grown just a short distance from the town. There's also Cornish fish, freshly-baked bread, honey, jam and sweet treats – and much more, including soap, jewellery and gifts.

Mark Floyd of Herland Roots says: "From our market garden, we have our salad mix, microgreens, cucumbers, tomatoes and spring onions. We're also growing lots of herbs, like basil, coriander and parsley, and we have organic carrots, aubergines, and mushrooms from local farms. There will be lots of lovely fresh fruit – our own raspberries and blackcurrants, and strawberries from other local growers."



Mark also looks after the deli stall, which offers a wide selection of local cheeses, olives and truffles, and fermented products like kimchi and kombucha.

Recipe: Cornish crab cakes with sweet chilli sauce

Resident St Ives Local chef Daniel Rouncefield, AKA The Cornish Chef, is back. This recipe involves panko breadcrumbs. These are made from a crustless white bread that is processed into flakes and then dried. They have a dryer and flakier consistency than regular breadcrumbs, and as a result they absorb less oil. Panko produces lighter and crunchier tasting fried food. The receipe serves four, with 20 mins prep time and 15 mins cooking.

INGREDIENTS

200g Cornish crab 2 baking potatoes 1 red onion 50g chives 1 lemon, zest 2 eggs 50ml milk 50g flour 150g panko breadcrumbs Good quality sea salt Cracked black pepper 1 red chilli 25ml water 85ml white wine vinegar 175g caster sugar 10 ml fish sauce 1/2 clove garlic 1tsp ginger 10g cornflour

METHOD


Peel, quarter, and put the potatoes in a pan with cold water and a pinch of salt. Bring to the boil and cook for 8–10 minutes until soft — when a knife wont hold them up any more. Drain and allow to steam dry. In a mixing bowl, add the crab, diced red onion, chopped chives, lemon zest salt, and pepper, and mix together using your fingers, feeling out for any shell. Mash the potatoes and add to the crab mix. Into 3 bowls put the flour, the egg and milk mix, and the panko breadcrumbs. Make 8 even balls of the mix, and shape




into the traditional fish cake shape. First put into the flour to coat, shaking off any excess, then into the egg wash, allowing any egg to drip off, and finish in the breadcrumbs making sure the whole

cake is fully coated. You can shallow fry until the breadcrumbs are golden brown. If possible I preferer to deep fry for 5 minutes at 180°c. When out, put them on kitchen roll to absorb any excess oil. Sprinkle with a little sea salt. For the sweet chilli sauce, mix the water and cornflour together in a bowl or jug. Place all the remaining ingredients in a saucepan and bring to the boil. Once boiling, whisk the water and cornflour solution and boil a for further 1–2 minutes. Remove from the heat and leave to cool. Serve on a bed of leaves with a ramekin of the sweet chilli sauce.



"Wild the weather and brave the crew": Remembering the St Ives lifeboat disaster, in words and music

A much-loved poem which commemorates the loss of the St Ives lifeboat on 23rd January 1939 has now been set to music and will be performed for the first time on the town's Lifeboat Day on 15th August.

The poem, The Ballad of the St Ives Lifeboat – John and Sara Eliza Stych, written in 1975 by local lady Patricia Hodge, describes the wild winter's night when the lifeboat was launched just before 2am to go to the aid of a stricken vessel near Cape Cornwall. Five hours later came the devastating news that the lifeboat had been wrecked on the rocks at Godrevy Lighthouse, and that of its eight crew, William Freeman was the sole survivor.

Composer Katrina Geraghty, who grew up in St Ives, explains how the poem became a song. "I had known of Patricia Hodge's poem for several years, but it was only in January of this year, when my friend Janet Mitchell – Pat's daughter – sent a video commemorating the 85th anniversary of the St Ives lifeboat disaster, that the idea of writing a song based on the idea was planted.

"The disaster is a very significant event in the town's history," says Katrina. "Every St Ives family was affected, one way or another, and its repercussions were felt down the years. Patricia's spiritual poem captures perfectly the terror of that night and the fallout in the days that followed. It also carries much hope for the future, and for the generations to come, and recognises humbly and thankfully the bravery and dedication of all those who serve, or have served, in our wonderful RNLI." Katrina was responsible for music at St Ives School from 2004 to 2015, and has taught both GCSE and A Level music composition. "I have tried to create a song which captures the essence of ballad writing, ie, the telling of the story, which also has a strong Celtic feel, and a memorable tune which people can sing to, if they wish to do so," she says.

"When time and space allow, I am planning to develop the song further to include a string quartet, and already have the players lined up, keen to perform."

Janet, who has known Katrina since their schooldays in St Ives, is immensely proud of her late mother's poem, which won a national competition. "Katrina's music has brought the poem to life," she says. "Every time I listen to it, I feel moved."

Andy Smith, curator of St Ives Museum, agrees. "The song is so special. The first time I played it, I was at the museum, and I opened the door and looked out at the waves – and I thought about the lifeboat.

"The display about the disaster which we have at the museum is very evocative. We already have a reading of the poem by Brian Stevens available to listen to, but I particularly wanted this musical version, and I hope by next year to run it, if we can, with the film we have about the disaster."

Suzanne Tanner, fundraising manager of the RNLI in St Ives, says: "The memory of the men who were lost needs to be kept alive for the generations to come. We're delighted that Katrina is singing the song on Lifeboat Day, especially as this year is the 200th anniversary of the RNLI."

The Ballad of the St Ives Lifeboat – John and Sara Eliza Stych will be performed at St Ives lifeboat house at 11am on 15th August. It will be available as a CD and a download.

The Far Flung Collective: North, east, south, west

"We're inviting people to contemplate lines of connectedness of sky, sea and earth, all converging at this corner of the British Isles". This is the intent of the Far Flung Collective – three creatives who are staging an exhibition in St Ives in August. The works created by Mary Scott, Bev Campbell and Briony Jenkins range from mesmerising abstractions of Cornish coasts and rocks, to snatches of birdsong captured in oils, and Scottish skies as broad as they are deep.

What brings the three artists together is a common concern for the natural environment. "In our own ways, we capture our emotional response to the skies and the land, to what lives there, and to what lies beneath," says Mary. "Our work is about the sense of awe that we encounter in the natural world – and the need to treasure and preserve it." These themes are shaped partly by the backgrounds of the three artists. Mary is a former geologist, influenced by time, depth and space, who now lives and paints in St Ives. Bev taught in prisons, with students deprived of natural light and sound. The trio met at Newlyn School of Art.
"The lines that connected us were a love of abstraction and of the elements uniting our work and giving it synergy," says Mary.
"We chose the name Far Flung because the three of us work from north-east Scotland; Bristol and Devon; and Cornwall. We are delighted to be together again in west Cornwall – its rich backdrop of sea, skies, birdlife and earth will provide a truly inspirational setting for our show."

Atkins is primarily a plein-air painter working outside, often on an epic scale, to immerse himself physically and emotionally in the landscape. Large boards are staked-down on location often for days (or even weeks) at a time letting the weather and environment help shape the work.

Ray Atkins was born in Exeter, Devon in 1937. He studied at Bromley College of Art in Kent

at the Slade School of Fine Art. Atkins was inspired by Frank Auerbach and worked for a time in Auerbach's studio. Atkins' first teaching post was at Reading University in 1965, and his first one-person exhibition at the Whitechapel Gallery, London in 1974. A teaching post at Falmouth Art School in 1974 was followed by a thirty-four year stay in Cornwall where Atkins painted the extraordinary landscape of the China Clay country around St Austell. He moved to France in 2009. Ray Atkins, A Painter's Odyssey, is at the Belgrave Gallery, Towednack, until 8th July.







Secret Gardens of Lelant: Roses, lemon trees, and a model railway

The sun shone down on Lelant on a glorious June day, when the owners of 12 village gardens opened their gates to guests. The Secret Gardens of Lelant, an annual fundraising event for the village hall, gives eager visitors the chance to explore gardens not usually open to the public – from sweeping lawns and mature trees in the grounds of Victorian villas, to traditional cottage gardens in the heart of the village, and wide open spaces and architectural planting surrounding contemporary waterfront houses.

"People say thank you to us for opening our garden, but we love it," says Andrew Hicks, who lives with his wife Anne in Church Road. "We get to meet people we've never met before and chat to people we already know. Lelant is a lovely community." Features of Andrew and





Anne's garden include a lily pond, a vine – "it makes lovely grape juice" – and an array of yellow, crimson and pale pink roses sharing space with self-seeded wildflowers.



The brilliant red geraniums climbing the wall by the front door have been particularly successful this year. "Aren't they stunning?" says Andrew with satisfaction. A lemon tree normally thrives in this sunny garden, but the wet winter proved to be a challenge. "It lost a lot of leaves in the winter, but it's come through, and there are plenty of flowers and a few lemons on it now."

David Jones' lemon tree is also making up for lost time, producing its first blooms after a quiet start, His lush cottage garden, with its abundant multicoloured borders and immaculate lawn, is, he admits: "a lot of work



- but I enjoy it". When David and his wife Ann came to live at The Saltings 30 years ago, they planted a copper beech branch which is now a magnificent tree towering over the garden. The main drawback of living close to the banks of the Hayle Estuary is an occasional unwelcome four-legged guest, says David. "Once, I'd just planted up a border when a badger destroyed all the plants – they ended up broken on the lawn!"



This isn't a problem likely to face Amanda and Charles Lilley in their Middle Eastern-style courtyard garden at Saltings Reach, which has a miniature pool and fountain, mature palms and citrus trees – including another Lelant lemon tree which suffered in the winter, but is now in bud. The lime tree, though, is very prolific.

"Last year, I had to put a lot of limes in the freezer and look for any recipe I could find which uses lime!" says Amanda. "The pomegranate plant came from our previous home in Oxfordshire, where it never flowered, but since we've been here, we've had two flowers, which are like red pompoms. I'm now



determined to produce a pomegranate!" The garden's dominant colour is a restful green, but Amanda also adores damask roses. "They have a wonderful scent," she says.

Mary Hayes would agree with that. "I never buy a rose without a scent," she says. "Why would you? And I love other plants with a perfume, like jasmine." A huge variety of plants thrive in Mary's sheltered, secluded garden in Vicarage Lane. Her husband Nick helps with the gardening – but his great passion is for his model railway, and visitors to the garden were able to see it in action. He's often asked how long it took him to build it. The answer? "A lot of time – and I keep doing more bits!" Mary has a similar attitude to the garden. She speaks for many gardeners when she says: "There's always room for another plant".



Out on the Towans

Making the most of the summer days

FRIENDS OF THE TOWANS

July and August usually see the Towans in full summer mode, with plants and animals trying to make the most of the long day length and warm weather to reproduce and build up a food store to see them through the winter months.

Alongside this, the Towans are also busy with us humans out and about in full force. Right now, I'm also feeling the fleetingness of summer and find myself wanting to make the most of this burst of light, warmth and summer energy! It feels such a contrast to the cold, stormy days of winter, when you have to pay so much more attention to get just a little glimpse of wildlife.

After our guided bird and plant walks in June, I've been inspired to really try and slow down, so I can take a closer look at all that's around. It's so easy to get caught up in rushing from place to place, and not really noticing our surroundings and much of the amazing wildlife which we're so lucky to have on our doorstep.



On our rush to the beach, it's easy to take the Towans for granted – but they are an important place in their own right. Most of Cornwall has acidic soil, derived from the underlying granite. By contrast, the dunes have calcareous soil, made from lime-rich shell sand. This nutrient-poor soil supports a much greater diversity of plants – over 300, one-fifth of all Cornwall's plant species, growing on less than 2% of Cornwall's land area!

This diversity of plants goes on to support a wide diversity of insects, birds and mammals – and you can come explore some of this amazing wildlife with us:





of the UK's most protected butterfly species can be found on the Towans and we hope (weather permitting!) to see some of them, especially the stunning silver-studded blue butterfly. Then on Monday 15th July, we have a guided glow-worm walk. This curious little creature is actually a small beetle, and to me, they seem quite magical, being able to make their own light! It's the flightless adult females that do most of the glowing, climbing up tall plant stalks to produce a green light to attract a flying male to mate with.

Other wildlife to watch out for over the summer include the red and black six-spot burnet and cinnabar moths; the yellow and black striped cinnabar moth caterpillars, which are often found feeding on ragwort plants; the tiny bursts of orange of small copper and gatekeeper butterflies; the larger orange of dark green fritillaries; and in late July and August, the dazzling common blue butterflies. In the plant world, you'll see the almost other-worldly, bluetinged spiky globe-shaped flowers of sea holly, and the striking blue viper's bugloss flowers, which grow around disturbed ground, particularly rabbit burrows.



St Ives Archive: Cryséde – silk frocks made on the Island

I could never understand why some people made such a fuss about a dress factory on the Island, here in St Ives. How on earth could that be interesting? Well, I've recently taken the trouble to look into this subject – and I hope you find it as fascinating as I now do!

It was suggested to me that the opening of the Cryséde factory meant that young women in both St Ives and Newlyn (where Cryséde started) had something more interesting – exciting even – to do than working in local shops or gutting fish. I remember one of our neighbours, who lived in Parc Bean, using a treadle sewing machine. Her feet went 'like the clappers'. Only recently I discovered that she had learned her trade working at Cryséde in the 1930s and early 1940s.

The Cryséde story began with the opening of a workshop in Newlyn in 1918 by Alec Walker, son of a Yorkshire mill-owner. In 1912, Alec had been given a small, rundown mill by his father, and he began producing silk garments, which he continued to do when he moved to Newlyn. The Cryséde company was founded in 1921. The fabrics produced gained a national reputation, and after Alec employed his friend, Tom Heron, as manager of the company, it went from strength to strength.

In 1926, the company transferred to larger premises on the Island. An article in the St Ives Times wrote of the arrival as "this interesting and wonderful factory", and expressed a hope that the town would extend a hearty welcome to the firm. This they did, with girls desperate to work there, especially as staff facilities were excellent. By 1930, there were around 120 employees.

The dyeing and finishing of the silk was carried out using old pilchard tanks, specially adapted – and thoroughly cleaned, one would hope! Alec's designs were printed using wooden blocks, approximately a foot square. This was a delicate and time–consuming process, which explains why the garments were so expensive.

Alec often went to nearby villages to make sketches to convert into patterns. Designs also featured ballet dancers, flowers, birds and dogs. Later, the company took on George Criscuolo as another designer, and he created many new styles. The garments were sold countrywide, including in Bond Street in London, and through mail-order catalogues.

Sadly, Cryséde went into liquidation in around 1940. Alec Walker's first marriage had ended in 1929; in 1933 he married again and moved back to Yorkshire, but this marriage also ended in divorce. He then moved to Falmouth, where he died in 1964.

Currently, there are exhibitions of Cryséde garments at St Ives Museum, Hayle Heritage Centre and the Royal Cornwall Museum in Truro. Penlee House Gallery and Museum in Penzance always has some of the clothes on display, as a permanent celebration of this very special company.

Damp is bad for your property, for your health, and the health of tenants. Take the time to repair any issues with air vents. Make sure any extractor fans are working properly and make sure that your air bricks

are clear.

Repairing a broken or damaged slate or tile is a small job now, but if it is not done it can cause a big problem. Make sure your roof is moss free as this will slow down water exiting, and make sure any gutters are free of dirt and detritus.

Chimneys always get a battering from the weather. Check cowls, brick or stonework

and mortar.


