# Local firm takes on responsibility for town waste

St Ives Town Council and Star Refuse Collection Services are working together on waste collection services across public spaces, parks, and gardens. The collaboration has seen Star take on responsibility for emptying a number of general waste, recycling, and dog waste bins in and around St Ives. There is potential to expand the service in the future. Over the last few months, the town council has taken ownership of many parks, gardens, and green spaces, including their public litter bins. The council's aim is, wherever possible, to improve the quality of litter bins, the frequency of emptying, and making sure they are kept clean and in good repair. Star is collecting from: Trewyn Gardens, Man's Head, Palemon Best Park. Memorial Gardens, The Island, Sloop car park, Chy-an-Gweal Gardens, and Richmond Gardens. New bins designs are being rolled out, too.

### Criminals' cash loss is St Ives Pilot Gig Club's gain

Money seized from criminals is being put to good use in West Cornwall, with St Ives Pilot Gig Club receiving £500 from local police to help fund new seating for one of its boats.


"It's fantastic that we can use money earned through criminal activity for good, putting the money back into our community to support local people," said Police Community Support Officer Terry Webb. "This club has been at the heart of the community for 35 years, welcoming hundreds of people on board to keep fit and learn new skills out on the sea. I'm pleased we were able to make a difference by helping to get the boat safely back in the water." The Fortitude, with newly fitted seats, raced during the annual World Pilot Gig Championships on the Isles of Scilly in May. Pete Preston, chairman of

the St Ives Pilot Gig Club, said: "As a small club with a big heart, we are open to all our local community. The funding of this much-needed equipment enables us to redirect our limited club funds towards ongoing required maintenance of our gigs, helping to ensure the future of the club in the town.

"We are extremely thankful to PCSO Webb for helping us get these funds for a new set of seats for Fortitude." Police in Cornwall continue to support groups, projects, and charities in the local area with money from the Proceeds of Crime Act fund, which contains funds seized from criminality.







### Box of delights: groups answer telephone call

The telephone box at the top of Tregenna Hill became a St Ives landmark in recent years, thanks to delightful, ever-changing displays created by local artist Mark Campbell.

Sadly, Mark passed away last year, but local guest house owner Robyn Calder has taken over the care of The Booth in his memory, and, since Christmas, she has invited different community organisations to decorate it in their own way each month.

In May, members of St Ives Arts Club's Crafty Corner adopted a superheroes theme with a St Ives twist, which included a seagull swooping on a super-sized ice cream. For June, Edward Hain Centre's staff and volunteers used knitted figures and a teddy bear in an EHC T-shirt to highlight the wellbeing services and community facilities which the centre offers.

Look out for more colourful and imaginative displays at The Booth in July and August.





### Be part of a creative community event

Plans for Hayle Arts Festival are back on track, after it was postponed in June to allow more preparation time. It is hoped that the event can take place during September.

Hayle Town Council's Engagement Manager Julie Baldwin explained that there had been issues trying to secure suitable venues for



arts-based activities, and some artists who were interested in running particular projects were not available on the festival's original June dates.

Ideas for the festival include exhibitions and displays, pop-up musical and theatrical performances, and art and craft workshops, in a variety of locations around the town.

Julie is applying for funding to support specific projects. Her message to artists is: "If you have an idea for a project that will need funding, do get in touch with an outline and a rough idea of costs, and then we can have a conversation about how it may be included. Linking in with health and wellbeing themes would be helpful. If you would like to exhibit work at the event, please do let me know."

She is asking artists who have already filled in the town council's form expressing interest in taking part to confirm that they would still like to offer the same activity. Forms are available from Julie at julie.baldwin@hayle. council.net for anyone who has not previously completed one.



### **News from St Ives Lifeboat Station**

### **Drifting yacht located off Newquay**

At 12.50pm on Monday 12 May, St Ives RNLI launched our all-weather lifeboat *Nora Stachura*, after a yacht was reported missing and later spotted adrift 20 miles north west of Newquay. A passing fishing vessel raised the alarm after seeing the yacht under sail but with no one visible on deck. As our crew approached, the skipper emerged from below. He was safe and well, having earlier cleared a rope from his propeller, though he still had no forward propulsion. He declined assistance and was able to manage the situation himself.

Rob Cocking, RNLI Coxswain, said: "Our volunteer crew responded quickly to what could have been a serious incident. Thankfully, the skipper was safe. We remind all boaters to maintain engines, carry enough fuel and have the right tools and spares on board."

Hayle Town Council has been working closely with representatives of the Environment Agency, Natural England, Cornwall Council, and other organisations to help ensure that the entrance to Hayle Harbour remains safe and navigable – and in a sustainable way that minimises harm to the local environment.

Town clerk Eleanor Giggal said: "During discussions, it has become apparent that the issues associated with the management of the sand, erosion of the dunes, and the risks of potential flooding and loss of transport links





# **Recipe**Garlic and chilli beef flatbread

Resident St Ives Local chef Daniel Rouncefield, of The Inn For All Seasons is back with a new recipe. "This is a beautiful, easy summer dish that includes a home-made flatbread, with just two ingredients. he says. "We currently have it on our menu at The Inn For All Seasons, but if you want to make it yourself to impress your friends and family, this is how!" Serves four.

### **INGREDIENTS**

For the flatbread 400g Greek yoghurt 450g plain flour For the tzatziki 200g Greek Yoghurt 1 cucumber 50g fresh mint 1 lemon For the garlic and chilli butter 100g sofetened butter 50g parsley 2 red chillis 4 garlic cloves For the topping 2 steaks of your choice — I use 8oz sirloin 100g rocket 2 red peppers

### **METHOD**

Firstly, make the flatbread. In a large bowl, mix the yoghurt and the flour with a pinch of salt until you form a dough. You may need to add a little extra flour if the mix is too sticky. It should form a ball and come clean off your hands. Split into 4 equal portions. On a floured



surface roll out each dough ball to the size of your frying pan. In a pre-heated frying pan, drizzle a little olive oil and fry each flatbread for roughly 2-3 minutes each side, before flipping drizzle a little oil on the flatbread, this will help with the chard crispy bits.

Next, make the tzatziki. Slice down the length of the cucumber and remove the seeds. Dice and mix with the yoghurt, chopped mint, black pepper, lemon zest, and juice.

Make a butter with the chopped garlic, finely sliced chilies, and parsley. And prepare the steak and peppers by slicing both finely and putting them in a bowl.

In a large hot frying pan — or two smaller ones — heat some olive oil until shimmering. Add the steak and peppers and fry for 4–5 minutes, depending on how you like your steak. Halfway through, add the garlic and chili butter and let it melt all around the pan. Once cooked, take off the heat and allow to rest. This will make the meat more tender.

Lay your flatbread on the plate with dollops of tzatziki and spoon the beef and peppers over the lot, using all the juices from the pan. Top with fresh rocket and enjoy!

They have also sold out The Hall For Cornwall, and tickets are flying out for their St Ives show.

and The Countrymen.

St Ia Church has announced a nine-night music line-up, headed by British singer -songwriter Roo Panes, ahead of a European tour which will take him to Portugal, Poland, Switzerland and Austria. Also going to church are St Ives singers Molly Hocking, 2019 winner of ITV's The Voice, and Bailey Tomkinson with her band The Locals. There will be St Ia debuts for Just Like Clay, the Karnos Brass Band, and Not The Beatles, with shanty singers Bryher's Boys, ska band Rudi's Message, and the Celtic Male Ensemble choir all returning.

Lowender, a Community Interest Company which champions Cornwall's culture and living traditions, is bringing a Night of Cornish Song to St Ia. Hireth, a four-part harmony vocal group sing in the Cornish language, Kernewek, and offer a mix of striking original works and traditional Cornish songs. Also singing in Kernewek is Elizabeth Freeborn, a Cornish-born singer-songwriter with a passion for the magic of nature, and Fest Da Lowr, a fiddle and guitar duo who bring the old sounds of Cornwall to life. Their music weaves Kernewek into stories that emerge from, and speak of, Cornish landscapes and folk traditions, celebrating and exploring the culture that is so meaningful to them.

Music and the arts come together at Penwith Gallery in Back Road West, where Boilerhouse with Annamaria Murphy, and Djazz Celtica, plus artist Jason Lilley's free Penwith Archive talk complement five shows: the work of Vincent Wilson; the Lanyon exhibition; the Summer Members' Show; Stephanie Sandercock and Julie Moselen's Wishes On The Wind; and Glyn Macey's

exhibition.

Tregenna Castle Hotel will be the venue for an Art Exhibition and Evening, including dinner, with renowned artist Susan Fowler, in support of the Motor Neurone Disease Association, while St Ives Library has a varied daytime programme of music, talks, poetry and workshops.





Writing The Housewives' Itch was a new venture for Nicole, a singer-songwriter known as The Cornish Lark – and our advertising manager here at St Ives Local. But she is not new to drama, having begun her acting career playing a clown in a St Ives Infants School play, and then playing the lead in Mary Poppins and Grease in junior and senior school productions. Nicole studied performing arts at Cornwall College and she later joined St Ives' Boathouse

Theatre.

Back in her schooldays, Nicole arranged a work experience placement at the Acorn Theatre in Penzance, so it was appropriate that the Acorn was the venue for the first performance of The Housewives' Itch in April, a sell-out which attracted a standing ovation, and audience comments such as "relatable, funny

"Kay and I were both overwhelmed by the audience's reaction as the play came to an end," says Nicole. "It's a memory we will both cherish forever. # Art An inspirational homecoming for a young Penwith artist and mother

A Soft Landing is a new body of work by Esme Lansdowne coming to the Penwith Gallery this summer. It was created during a transformative chapter of returning to her homeland of Cornwall and entering motherhood.

The exhibition marks both a creative and personal homecoming – a full-circle moment shaped by early artistic influences, deep emotional roots, and an evolving relationship with the land she calls home. Created amid the quiet intensity of early motherhood, these works reflect a shifting sense of time, identity, and place.

Drawing on her materialled practice, Esme uses natural earth pigments sourced from the Cornish landscape to create abstract works that respond to the elemental forces and textures of place. These works are reflections on belonging and the grounding pull of home. Raised in St Ives and shaped

An emerging artist with a growing reputation, Esme has exhibited widely in the UK and internationally. Her most recent exhibition, Intertwined Narratives, showing at TwentySix Gallery, Wellington, marks her debut in New Zealand and features works created during her residency at Driving Creek Pottery in the Coromandel. Her work has been featured at galleries such as Anima Mundi in St Ives and the Tyler Gallery in Mousehole.

Esme's practice reflects her commitment to the land and the stories it holds, creating art that resonates with a sense of history and connection.

A Soft Landing opens at the Penwith Gallery on 18th July and runs until 18th August.



# **Ceramics**Busy summer ahead for Leach team

For over a century, the Leach Pottery has been a site of training and learning – weaving people, pots, ideas, and cultures together. Its early spirit was experimental: a small studio exploring clay, firings, and forms. Over the decades, the pottery's wares and focus shifted, evolving into a communal studio of craftspeople.

A new exhibition, opening on 20th July, tells the story of a small number of the Leach Pottery's students; from 1923 when they began to arrive, to key points such as 1938 with the start of the Leach Apprentices, and their more formal training, that was reinvigorated in 2014. The Leach has also trained countless student-apprentices, and delivers workshops supporting many community learners.

The intriguing collection of pots from the Leach Studio and individual potters – some made at the Leach Pottery, some in the potter's own studios – gives a sense of how potters respond to their time there; some adopting, developing or even rejecting the

aesthetics and ideas. Students Over a Century opens on 20th July and runs until 31st October in the Cube Gallery.

Mulchelney Pottery: 60 Years Strong is open in the Shop Gallery and runs until 20th July (it will be online from 18th August until 14th September). It features Muchelney Kitchenware alongside selected individual pots by John Leach, Mark Melbourne, and Nick Rees.

Muchelney Pottery was established in the heart of the Somerset Levels, in 1965, by John and Lizzie Leach. John, the eldest grandson of Bernard Leach, designed the iconic Kitchenware range of 'toasted' wood-fired stoneware for use: from oven-to-table cooking, to serving and drinkware.

# West Cornwall tea time

The Leach Pottery: One & All celebrates creativity across today's Leach Pottery and runs from 12th July until 1st November. The exhibition features individual potters from the Studio alongside colleagues across the Leach Pottery, including some freelance tutors. The eclectic selection of pots tell of the pottery's creative diversity and the potters' love of clay. Every week in August, the Leach will be touring West Cornwall towns with workshops making the constituent parts of a tea set: tea bowls, sugar bowls, jugs, and milk pourers. Sessions will take place at: The Exchange, Penzance (5th August); Hayle Recreation Ground (12th August); Camborne Library (19th August); and the Butter Market, Redruth (26th August). # St Ives Archive: Alfred Wallis Child Pauper to Artistic Luminary

# A new in-depth biography by Matilda Webb

Alfred Wallis is one of St Ives best-loved artists. His paintings greatly influenced Britain's early Modern Art scene and are enduringly popular today. He was born in Devon to Cornish parents whose ancestors were firmly rooted in West Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly. He returned to his native land as a young teenager, having survived an impoverished childhood in the slums of Devonport.

Such resilience was to aid Wallis in times of hardship, particularly in battling great storms on the Atlantic Ocean in small, topsail schooners. Not long after these harrowing experiences, Wallis gave up life at sea and settled in Penzance with his wife, Susan Ward, and her five children.

In 1882 Wallis and his family moved to St Ives where he ran a marine stores business in the building which is now the Lifeboat Inn. But as the sea would flood the ground floor of the business at especially high tides, they soon moved to the top of a steep lane in Downlong, and eventually to a large premises on the Wharf.

Wallis would set out around the town with a cart pulled by his donkey Neddy, and later his pony Fairyfoot, while he called out "Rag-a-bone! Old Iron! Old Iron! Rag-a-bone!". People took to calling him Old Iron, and as nicknames were an important feature of St Ives society, it shows that although Wallis was not a St Ives man, he had become part of the town.

Wallis and his wife retired to a small cottage in Back Road West. It was here he took up painting as a hobby in 1925, at the age of 70. Three years later he sold some of his work to two young artists, Christopher Wood and Ben Nicholson, after which he went on to paint prolifically. He sold most of his work to friends and patrons of these two artists, all of whom were prominent writers, critics and collectors in the British Modern Art world.

Despite the acclaim he received both at home and abroad, Wallis made very little money from his paintings. In 1941, destitute and gravely ill, he was taken to the workhouse, which by then had been

renamed Madron Public Assistance Institution. After his death on 29 August 1942, his family funeral at Barnoon Cemetery was interrupted part-way through by his admirers, who then organised a private grave and second funeral, described as "a queer little ceremony". Wallis's grave lay bare and unmarked for a year and a half until the potter Bernard Leach suggested he make a set of decorative tiles to cover it. Thus Leach created a beautifully unique and fitting memorial for Wallis that can still be seen today.

In Alfred Wallis Child Pauper To Artistic Luminary, author Matilda Webb brings together a wealth of newly discovered information about both the life and works of this fascinating figure. She reveals Wallis's turbulent life story and challenges the prevailing narratives surrounding his interactions with the 'real artists' who championed his work. St Ives Archive has played a significant role in providing access to original source material about the town of St Ives in Wallis's day, for which the author is extremely grateful.

Alfred Wallis painted autobiographical events close to his heart. The key to understanding his paintings is to understand his life, and this richly illustrated biography offers many new insights to do just that.



The loss of 97% of our wildflower meadows since the 1950s, has contributed to a massive 60% decline in our insect population in the last 20 years, (Research by Wildlife trust and Buglife).

There was a time when windscreens would be covered in dead insects after a single journey, no longer. We have a problem!

We need insects to pollinate our crops, so our food supplies are stable. We need wildflowers which evolved alongside our insects to provide food for those insects.

All our much-loved garden plants have been bred from native flowers, and sadly in some cases features that so benefited our wildlife have been lost in that process.

There is so much to appreciate in our wildflowers, and that includes the gloriously bright and cheerful dandelion, often known as the fairy clock, valued for its beauty, and seen as a symbol of hope, healing and resilience in many countries. Dandelions are amongst the very best nectar plants.

Dandelion seeds were even carefully taken by the early settlers to America. Why? Because of their health-giving properties. We now understand that many of the ailments' dandelions helped to treat were the result of a lack of vitamins and minerals in the diet.

As recently as the nineteenth century families grew them in vegetable patches as nutritious greens.

Dandelions are highly nutritious, yes, you can eat them...raw young leaves in salads and stir fries, steamed if older, but only eat unsprayed leaves, picked away from roads! They provide more goodness than most of the vegetables in your garden, more vitamin C than tomatoes, also iron, calcium, potassium, magnesium, zinc, and many of the major vitamins. In some countries dandelion greens are more expensive than lobster, or steak!

But they also provide huge benefits for wildlife. They are a major part of the diet of butterflies, bees, birds and moths, especially in urban areas, providing rich nectar and pollen which is easy to access, from very early in the year to autumn. They will attract around 100 differing pollinators to their golden blooms. Quite something!

On top of this, the main tap root of a dandelion is usually around 30cms long but can reach over 4 metres deep! These long roots tap into rich nutrients deep in the soil and pull them up, feeding themselves and other surrounding plants, a natural fertiliser! Further, as the roots push through even the toughest most compacted soil, they loosen, aerate and break it up, increasing pockets of oxygen within the soil, so improving plant growth.

Birds love the seeds, especially finches.

Control is simple if needed, remove some of the seed heads, if the finches don't mind! Never use chemical sprays.

You could remove all of these glorious flowers. Then again, you could decide that some of them would so help wildlife, your soil, your plant diversity, as well as brighten up your lawn or flower beds, that you won't. Have a think, what matters most? Maybe let some dandelions stay to save our struggling and fast declining insects.





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# Gardens A tropical paradise in the heart of Lelant

The lush garden of Trelan delighted guests with its tropical atmosphere when it opened its gates for the Secret Gardens of Lelant in early June, and later in the month for the National Garden Scheme. Artist and gardener Nick Williams will once again be welcoming visitors on 27th July, this time in aid of Cornwall Wildlife Trust.

The garden's special features include a natural swimming pond, a beautiful Italianate sunken garden with a lemon tree, two massive Trachycarpus Fortunei trees, and huge banana plants. Trelan also has a fern garden, numerous young trees and countless Echium Pininana plants, plus a newly-planted



wildflower meadow beside the house.

Trelan is one of 10 gardens chosen to be part of Cornwall Wildlife Trust's Open Garden season, which began in mid-April and continues until 14th September. Each of the gardens is a showcase for wildlife-friendly gardening and a demonstration of creative ways to adapt to a changing climate.

As well as exploring these hidden gems, visitors can indulge in home-baked cakes, cream teas, and refreshments, thanks to the generous support of sponsors Roddas, Boddingtons, Cornico,

Cornish Scone Company, and Cornish Orchard. Over the past 12 years, Open Gardens has raised more than £150,000 to support Cornwall Wildlife Trust's vital conservation work.

Today's visitors can explore beautiful gardens and rolling parkland, and take in stunning coastal views from the ground floor rooms of the main house. The exhibition, Trelissick 70, features archive images of the estate, including some from the Second World War, and tells the

story of Ida Copeland and her husband, Ronald, and their influence on the garden.

For a second exhibition, Your Trelissick, visitors are being invited to share their memories of the estate by creating a postcard –sized piece of art or writing to be displayed in the house. The deadline for submissions is 10th August. Blank postcards can be collected from visitor reception and the house.

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# Property Is it time to ditch the carpet for a hard floor option?


In many cases, the best solution is to ditch the carpet altogether and swap it for a hard floor alternative. Summer is a good time to make the change as you may need to move some furniture outside while you clear the room. Plus, you can make the most of no longer having to scrub grass stains off that cream-coloured carpet!

Another benefit of hard floor is it modernises the space, making it feel fresh and roomy. And if you really can't do without the feel of something soft and warm underfoot, there's always the option of rugs, which are far easier to clean in the event of spillage.

Made from solid wood planks, hardwood flooring is known for its durability and natural beauty. These floors can be sanded and refinished multiple times, extending their lifespan significantly. However, they are easily scratched and are known to be sensitive to temperature change. They're also a more costly option which you'll want to get the pros in for. Laminate flooring is an affordable alternative to hardwood, offering a similar appearance but at a lower cost. It consists of a high-density fibreboard core with a top layer that mimics wood, stone, or tile. It's affordable, versatile, and easy to install, but it is easier to damage and cannot be refurbed like actual wood.

Vinyl is a cheap and varied option. Available in sheets, vinyl flooring is ideal for a kitchen or bathroom space as it is water-resistant. However it does lack the premium feel you might want in a lounge area.

Tiling is another versatile option. There is such a huge array of styles and you can go as premium or budget as you desire. Water resistant and hard wearing, it's again worth calling in the experts if you're at all unsure.











# St.Ives Windows



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Just like us humans, pets need a whole new grooming regime for summer. Sure, they don't wear sunscreen, trim their bikini lines or work on their abs, but there are certain vital steps that will vastly improve the warmer months, making the sunny season as glorious for them as it is for us!

#### Coat

If you've got a no-moult breed of dog (eg. A shih tzu or poodle), you will already be familiar with the process of getting regular grooms to keep everything clean and tidy.

Yet in the summer, most furry pets will require a little extra care, so invest in a good brush from your local pet shop to keep coats silky and knot free; and whether you've got canine, feline or rabbit, regular care with both a flea comb and spot-on or oral treatment, along with checks for ticks, are super important in warm weather.

#### **Paws**

Keeping your little one's claws trimmed is essential in any season, but should a nail grow into the skin during warms months when infections are more likely (due to more time spent outdoors and higher temperatures), your pet pal could be in real trouble.

So buy some clippers if you feel confident doing it, or pop down to your vet for a quick trim. This is especially important in anxious pets as it's easy to cut an animal who won't sit still.

And while you're maintaining paws, be on the lookout for grass seeds which get embedded, causing all kind of chaos.

#### **Face**

When the weather gets warmer, clear eyes and ears in dogs are essential. Fur around or inside can cause havoc, leading to infection and general icky, stickiness.

Trim hair around eyes with specialised scissors that have curved ends, or see a groomer who can do it for you; gently wipe eye gunk regularly and use a cotton ball with warm water to gently clean inside the ear (but never a cotton bud!).

If there are any peculiar smells or discharge a visit to the vet may be your best bet.

# **Insides**

Oral flea, tick, lungworm and tapeworm treatments are vital all year round, but especially so in summer months. Not only do pests and viruses such as these thrive in humid weather, they're also easier for pets to pick up. For example, that dubious looking puddle that your pup just drank from, or a discarded festival hot dog all have potential to make even the hardiest hound feel ruff. Some pet foods now include probiotics which offer an extra level of tummy protection.

As with most things pet-wise, you, as owner, will know the signs best, so be sure to act on them.

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
